BURCHELL, Ron: [Chair]

- has been a member of the Sierra Club of Canada since the Ontario Chapter was formed in 1970. As a volunteer in the field, he helps in maintaining and improving the infrastructures of recreational facilities. His motto; "Life's too darn short, so may as well make the best of it."

FREEMAN, Deborah: [Chair]

- is an advocate for the wild, resulting from many years of wilderness travel. Currently, she works with the Wildlands League, the Ontario Chapter of the Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society. The League is a non-profit organization dedicated to the protection and preservation of Ontario's parks and wilderness areas. Deborah coordinates the League's efforts to end non-park-conforming activities such as logging, gravel quarrying, and roading in Algonquin Park.

- works with her husband, Andy, at the Hulbert Outdoor Center, a non-profit educational center located in Fairlee, Vermont. The Centre offers a wide range of outdoor based programs, including School programs, Elderhostel, canoe trips, and team building programs for all ages. As part of her job, she coordinates Elderhostel, A Wilderness Paddlers Gathering in March, a Snow Walkers Rendezvous in November, and a Northern Issues Trip to Northern Quebec or Labrador each year.

WILSON, Hap: Temagami Images

Temagami ON

- a wilderness guide, photographer, artist and author, environmental activist, and adventure tourism consultant. Has paddled over 48,000 km, primarily in shield country and Temagami. Presently working on a guide to Manitoba's Wild Rivers; has authored four canoe guide books, and contributed to the recently published <u>Voyages</u>.

WILTON, Mike: Algonquin Large Adult Male Bears

Whitney ON

- has been a biologist with the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources since 1961, in White River, Pembroke, and Algonquin Park.
